HOME LEARNING TIME-TABLE	 Creative Curriculum: At the beginning of each term, the children will bring home a grid with a range of activities relating to our topic. They can choose from the grid and bring their work in when completed. Details on the sheet. Tuesday: Maths, Spag and Spelling – to be handed in by the following Monday. A maths task – Mathletics. Children have individual login details in the front of their purple reading journals. Spag.com - online activities. Login details are in the children's purple books. Spelling and sentences – The children will bring home a handwriting sheet with their spellings. They need to practice their spelling/handwriting and then use 7 of their spellings in 7 separate sentences. Reading: Children are expected to read most nights and should use the purple reading journals provided, to record their thoughts and opinions about different texts, not just page numbers. Please feel to comment in the back if you have heard your child read aloud.
HOME LEARNING EXPECTATIONS	 Read at home, little and often is the best motto – between 20 and 30 minutes most nights. Homework should be handed in on time to avoid unnecessary upset. Please ensure that homework presentation is to a good standard.
HOW TO SUPPORT YOUR CHILD AT HOME	Praise your child and share an interest in what they are doing. Recognise their achievements and celebrate them. Ensure they undertake any home learning in a calm environment at a suitable time. Ask questions to probe thought and recognise their own errors or misconceptions. Ensure they have the right tools to do the job. Take a break if required. If it is proving too difficult, acknowledge that and write a note on it for the teacher. The most effective home learning is based on conversation about the world around them.
