	READING BOOKS: These are changed twice a week. Reading group A – Monday/Wednesday Reading group B – Tuesday/Thursday Your child is responsible for handing-in their book to get it changed. Please sign your child's home/school diary after reading with your child so that we know that you have read with your child at home.	
	MATHS : Mathletics is set every Friday and will support the learning that has been happening in class, or recap previous skills that have been taught.	
	TALK HOMEWORK : This will be given out on a Friday where appropriate. It will be a short question or statement to discuss with your child which will prepare them for the following week at school and consolidate their learning from the current week. You do not need to write anything down or bring anything in to school; it is just an opportunity to extend your child's thinking.	
HOME LEARNING EXPECTATIONS	 Read at home; little and often is the best motto, choosing varied texts in addition to the school reading scheme. Please remember to write your comments in the Reading Record Book provided. Talk homework should be undertaken at home as this will give you child a good head-start for their work in school. 	
HOW TO SUPPORT YOUR CHILD AT HOME	 Praise your child and share an interest in what they are doing. Recognise their achievements and celebrate them. Ensure they undertake any home learning in a calm environment at a suitable time. Ask questions to probe thought and recognise their own errors or misconceptions. Take a break if required – do not spend more than the recommended time.
